Dr. Kimlin Tam Ashing is Professor Beckman Research Institute; Associate Cancer Center Director of the Comprehensive Cancer Center; Deputy Director Division of Health Equities and Founding Director of the Center of Community Alliance for Research and Education (CCARE) at City of Hope Medical Center. She received her doctorate in Clinical Psychology from the University of Colorado, Boulder. As an advocate-scientist, she is advancing population health science and practice. She is a Population, Behavioral Scientist working closely with multiethnic and multisectoral partners (e.g., behavioral, basic, clinical and translational scientists, molecular epidemiologists, geneticists and community partners) to develop and implement evidenced based, culturally, clinically and community responsive health improvement studies and interventions. Her mission is to conduct multidisciplinary, translational research while engaging advocates and civil society in science to speed-up and ensure the public benefit of biomedical research and advancements.
